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## OVERVIEW

Shropshire has had a career of over 30 years as a professor, business consultant, author, and lawyer. His experiences have focused on a wide range of sports related issues from race, leading a global sporting event, stadium and arena construction and financing, the relocation of franchises, the transition of athletes from the playing field into business to focusing on diversity in sports. He is the author of foundational books focused on race and sports and one on sports agents. He is the coauthor of one of the leading texts on sport business for business schools as well as one of the leading undergraduate sports law texts. He has applied his solid business sense beyond sports via board experiences with a publicly traded company, a bank, a for-profit educational enterprise and several not-for-profit entities. He also served as the co-host of the Wharton Sports Business Show on SiriusXM Channel 11.
